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Dear Community Stakeholder,

The Pasco County Alliance for Substance Abuse Prevention (ASAP) Coalition has been busy at work this past year. Since our inception in 2006, we have increased our membership by over 500%. We enjoy active membership from many sectors of our community including law enforcement, faith-based organizations, youth-serving organizations, schools, businesses, civic groups, healthcare, behavioral health service providers, government, media, parents, and youth. We are very proud of the time and commitment that our community members give and we would not be able to do this work without them!

As always, our mission is "to develop, motivate, and encourage strategic relationships that reduce countywide risk factors and decrease substance abuse among youth and adults." Each year, ASAP works with researchers from the University of South Florida to gather and report the most prevalent and up-to-date substance abuse related data impacting Pasco County. In this Indicator Report, we

provide a balance of both quantitative and qualitative data from a variety of federal, state, regional and county sources. As you will see, the Indicator Report lends compelling information regarding alcohol and drug related trends impacting families in our community. ASAP examines this data closely in order to deploy evidence-based environmental strategies to target the substance abuse issues most prevalent in our community. Some of the most alarming trends this year and where we have focused much of our energy are surrounding Prescription Drug Abuse and Underage Drinking.

- In 2011, we surveyed Pasco County residents who were arrested for driving under the influence (DUI). Of the 852 respondents, 19% of them used prescription drugs in addition to alcohol at the time of their offense.
- In 2011, 199 children were removed from their homes with caregiver prescription drug involvement in Pasco County, costing our county over \$1.4 million.
- Pasco County has the highest rates in the State of Florida of newborns being born exposed to substances. They are often
 diagnosed with Neonatal Abstinence Syndrome (NAS) and suffer weeks of painful withdrawal symptoms in the hospital
 immediately after birth.
- Pasco County stores that sell liquor or beer were checked throughout the year for compliance with not selling to minors. 26% of the stores checked for compliance in Pasco County sold alcohol to underage youth in 2011.
- Our local college data tells us that 20% of first year college students in Pasco County drove after having 4 or more drinks, and 27% rode with a driver who had been drinking.

This report will also discuss ASAPs strategies aimed to reverse the trends described above. We are confident that our focused efforts will make a difference. Additionally, we work to keep ourselves apprised of new substance abuse dangers and possible upcoming trends. Although we do not have quantitative data just yet, we are deeply concerned with the use of synthetic drug, a.k.a. Spice and Bath Salts. Our hospital emergency rooms have noticed patients described as combative, agitated, delusional, or paranoid displaying symptoms of vomiting, seizures, elevated pulse, chest pains, and high blood pressure. To that end, ASAP has partnered with parents, faith based communities, and the Pasco Sheriff's Office to stay ahead of a possible trend and remain action-oriented to prevent further misuse and damage caused by these drugs.

With nearly a half of a million individuals residing in Pasco County, we have our work cut out for us. This report also highlights focused activities that ASAP conducts to help combat these negative trends and to make Pasco County a healthy and safe place for families. Please take a moment to review key accomplishments from 2012 found on page 8.

As an inaugural member and current chairperson for ASAP, I continue to feel honored and humbled to work with such an amazing group of dedicated people within Pasco County. On behalf of our Board of Directors and Executive Committee, I would like to thank our ASAP volunteers for the countless hours that they have provided throughout the year to promote healthy and safe communities within our County. 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Introduction

Area Description

Pasco County is located on the Gulf of Mexico. Pasco is comprised of 868 square miles of land and is approximately 35 miles from Tampa. The County contains six municipalities: New Port Richey, Port Richey, San Antonio, St. Leo, Zephyrhills, and Dade City, which is the county seat. Located less than an hour's drive north of downtown Tampa and St. Petersburg, Pasco County is a transitioning suburban community. It is the 50th fastest growing county in the United States, with 105,403 new residents since the year 2000 (constituting a 30.6% increase). According to the 2010 census estimate, the population was 464,697, with 88.2% White, 4.5% Black or African American, 2.1% Asian, and 5.2% other races. Census figures also indicate that 11.7% of Pasco's population report being of Hispanic or Latino origin, the slight majority (51.4%) are female, median age is 43.6 years, and 12.3% live below the poverty level. There are 35,978 students in grades 6-12 (16,151 in middle school and 19,827 in high school). Currently, there are nearly 800 licensed premises that sell alcoholic beverages and 19 licensed pain clinics in Pasco County.

Pasco County Alcohol and Drug Indicator Analysis

Indicator reporting programs are a useful means of gauging the extent of local alcohol and drug use and their related problems. Additionally, collecting indicator data over time will help to ascertain the impact of efforts designed to reduce alcohol and drug use and its related problems. Indicators can be used by community leaders in the following ways: (1) to identify the most important local substance use problems, (2) to drive community prevention and treatment strategies, and (3) to evaluate the results of new policies and programs. To this end, the Pasco County Alliance for Substance Abuse Prevention (ASAP) worked with researchers to conduct an evaluation of adolescent and adult alcohol and drug use indicators available throughout Pasco County. The data was compared to state averages.

Liquor Law Violations definition ¹: Violation of laws or ordinances prohibiting the manufacture, sale, purchase, transportation, possession or use of intoxicating alcoholic beverages.

- DUI arrests for Pasco County and Florida statewide increased slightly from 2011 to 2012 then decreased in 2010 then decreased in 2013.
- Pasco County's drug/narcotic arrests peaked in 2010, whereas Florida statewide experienced reductions in this area from 2007 to 2013.
- Pasco's liquor law violations increased substantially from 30 violations in 2007 to 135 in 2011 then decreased to 74 violations in 2013.

Figure 2. Pasco County Liquor Law Violations



- Similar to Florida's statewide rates, Pasco County's past month use of any alcohol decreased from 2006 to 2014 but are still slightly higher than statewide.
- Consistent with statewide rates in 2010, Pasco County's past 30-day use rates were at their peak for marijuana and any illicit drug use then decreased in 2012 and increased in 2014.
- Binge drinking declined from 20.3% in 2006 to 8.8% in 2012, resulting in an 57% decrease.

Figure 3. Past 30-day Use of Alcohol, Tobacco and Other Drugs among Pasco County Middle and High School Students, 2014







- From 2010 to 2014, past month alcohol use and binge drinking decreased among both middle and high school students.
- Among middle and high school students, 2014 had the lowest rates for any alcohol use, binge drinking, cigarettes, inhalants, any illicit drug except marijuana, and alcohol or any illicit drug.
- Past 30-day alcohol use among high school students steadily decreased from 46.4% in 2006 to 28.8% in 2014.
- Past 30-day marijuana use among high school students increased from 16.9% in 2012 to 20.1% in 2014, a 19% increase.
- Inhalents are the only drug used more by middle school than high school students.







In 2012, Centennial Middle School's Students Against Destructive Decisions (SADD) and ASAP collaborated for the 3rd Annual Rally Against Underage Drinking. SADD's theme was "Don't Be A Number" based on the statistic 5,000 people under the age of 21 die each year from alcohol-related incidences.

- From 2006 to 2014, fewer Pasco County students reported lifetime use of alcohol, and this downward trend was also parallel to Florida's statewide data.
- In 2014, Pasco County reported its lowest rates since 2006 for use of alcohol, cigarettes, inhalants, any illicit drug except marijuana, and alcohol or any illicit drug.
- Pasco County reported increased use of marijuana from 2012 to 2014.
- One out of ten Pasco students reported using synthetic marijuana in the course of their lifetime.

- In 2012, Pasco County middle and high school reported their lowest lifetime rates of alcohol use since 2006; 23% decrease for middle school.
- Rates of lifetime use of marijuana in Pasco middle and high school increased from 2008 to 2010 then decreased in 2012 and 2014; 20% decrease for high school.
- Lifetime rates for alcohol and drug use generally double from middle to high school, except for inhalants which are higher for middle school than high school.
- In 2014, among high school students more than one in five (21.9%) reported blacking out and 10% reported using synthetic marijuana.




Figure 7. Alcohol Trends Summary for Pasco County 2004-2014

• Alcohol use continues to decrease as the associated harm with use increases (i.e., past 30-day, binge drinking, use by age 13).




Figure 8. Marijuana Trends Summary for Pasco County, 2004-2014

Figure 9. Usual Source of Alcohol within the past 30-days among High School Drinkers, Pasco County 2014




Figure 10. Usual Drinking Location within the past 30-days among High School Drinkers, Pasco County 2014




Figure 11. Comparisons of Past 12-month Delinquent Behavior Among Pasco County Middle and High School Students 2014







Figure 12. Bullying-related Behaviors among Pasco County Middle and High School Students, 2014




ATOD Use Before or During School, Pasco Count and Florida Statewide, 2014



DUI or Riding with a Driver Under the Influence, Pasco County 2012-2014 and Florida Statewide 2014









Past 30 Day Over-the-Counter Drug Use, Pasco County 2010-2014 and Florida Statewide 2014


Protective Factor Prevalence Rates for Pasco County and Florida Statewide Middle School Students, 2014




Protective Factor Prevalence Rates for Pasco County and Florida Statewide High School Students, 2014



Figure 14. Pasco County Alcohol-Related Fatalities



Figure 15. Comparison of Pasco and Pinellas Counties Drug-Related Deaths by Non-Lethal Level




Figure 16. Comparison of Pasco and Pinellas Counties Drug-Related Deaths by Lethal Level



Figure 17. Pasco County Lethal Level of Drug is Cause of Death





Figure 18. Pasco County Non-Lethal Drug is Present at Death






Figure 20. 126 Million Oxycodone Pills Dispensed by the Top 100 Florida Pharmacies

Figure 21. 98 of the Top 100 Doctors Dispensing Oxycodone Nationally are in Florida







- Pinellas and Pasco Counties have consistently ranked number 1 and 2 in Florida respectively for the number of substanceexposed newborns.
- The number of infants treated for withdrawal symptoms in Florida hospitals increased 173% between 2006 and 2010.
- 63.2% of the 399 women ages 18-40 (child bearing age) that entered treatment, reported a prescription drug as their primary drug of choice in Pasco County (Baycare Behavioral Heatlh 2009/2010 Fiscal Year).
- 2.8% of Pasco County high school students report past 30-day use of prescription pain relievers (2012, Florida Youth Substance Abuse Survey).
- The number of female inmates in Pasco Sheriff's County jails that are pregnant and have substance abuse problems with prescription drugs is increasing.
- In 2008 in Pasco County, there were 159 ER visits for an opioid related incident. There were 86 overdoses of Benzodiazepine and 20 overdoses involing other tranquilizers (2008 Agency for Healthcare Administration).
- 59% of the 457 Pasco residents surveyed feel that there is not enough enforcement of prescription drugs (2010 Pasco Alcohol Policy and Prescription Drug Use Survey).
- Pasco Sheriff's Office collected a total of 2060.8 pounds of pills in 2011.
- Dade City Police Deptarment's permanent drop box collected over 1,000 pounds in 2011.


Figure 23. Pasco County Bath Salt Cases by Age




Figure 24. K-2/Spice Use in Pasco County by Age




Figure 26. K-2/Spice Use Nationwide

Figure 27. Adult Admissions to Pasco County Substance Abuse Providers



Appendix A: Who are Pasco's Impaired Drivers? The Current Results of the Last Drink Survey

They are:

- Male (69%)
- White (85%)
- Between 30 49 years of age (23% in the 30 -39 age group and 22% in the 40 49 age group), 5% are under 21

They consumed:

- Alcohol Only 83%
- Drugs Only 12%
- Alcohol and Drugs 5% (When BAC level is above .08 drugs are not tested.)
- Had 5 or more drinks (44%)
- Most likely at a club, bar or restaurant (52%) before arrest, 11% advised they were at a house party
- Beer was the most popular (50%) alcoholic beverage followed by mixed drinks (23%)
- Prescription drugs were the most common drug used (17%)

Arrested:

- They were most likely arrested on a Friday (20%) or a Saturday (21%)
- Had a BAC of .15 or Higher (29%)
- 42% refused to take a breath and/or a urine test
- For 67% it was their first offense
- They drove less than 5 miles before being arrested (69%)
- 53% were arrested by the Pasco Sheriff's Office
- 57% didn't think about getting arrested prior to arrest

Consequences:

• The loss of driver's license (42%) and financial costs (39%) were the greatest consequence of arrest.

The last drink survey is a self report survey completed by persons arrested for DUI and participating in the DUI Offender Program. It is nearing 2500 completed surveys submitted by impaired drivers in Pasco County. This a snapshot of survey highlights, for a complete survey contact Pasco ASAP.
