ASAP is our coalition that coordinates efforts to reduce county-wide risk factors for addiction, thereby preventing and decreasing substance misuse in a comprehensive and long-term manner that primarily impacts the youth in the community.



STAND Above the Influence is our youth led coalition that empowers youth to be agents of change by strengthening their voices and educating others to build a healthier community.

COALITION METRICS

MEDICATION DISPOSAL

From January through November 2023, the Pasco County Sheriff's Office. Dade City Policy Department, and New Port Richey Police Department collected 748.9 pounds of medication via their permanent pill drop boxes. The DEA Takeback held in April and October collected 1,196 pounds of medication.

ASAP IN THE MEDIA

We are proud to have been featured on numerous media outlets in 2023. We created a STAND PSA in 2022 and were able to air it in 2023. In partnership with the Pasco Sheriff's Office we created three PSAs on Opioids. We also created a PSA for the SEN committee which is airing now.

SOCIAL MEDIA

Pasco ASAP Facebook page reached 101,508 to date. This is up 5.6 percent. We have 3,288 followers.

DETERRA BAGS

From January to November 2023, we have distributed 4,381 DOSC – Deactivating Opioids for a Safer Community-Kits.

NARCAN

Along with our community partners, we have distributed 682 Narcan kits at our events.

In Pasco County there were 1,009 overdoses from January to October 2023. Of those, 219 were fatal, giving us a 21.7% fatality rate. Pasco County Sheriff's Office provided this data from their records management system and contains data from partner agencies.

Narcan QR Code Collaboration - We have had 678 scans to date for people requesting Narcan be mailed to them.

OUTREACH

ASAP, in partnership with YFA and BayCare, tabled 40 community events in 2023. Through these events we were able to disseminate prevention and awareness information to thousands of Pasco County residents.

SEN Knowledge is Power Virtual Series reached more than 100 people in 2023 with weekly virtual presentations focused on substance misuse prevention and safe sleep.

ASAP hosted the following community engagement events:

- Stronger Together Recovery Walk 3rd Annual Reached 500 people
- Opioid Townhall 100 people
- Alcohol Townhall 50 people

JDH SCHOLARSHIP

Jason Daniel Hughes Memorial Scholarship raised more than \$10,000 in donations for 2023. We were able to support 13 people with transitional living scholarships as they begin their journey to long term recovery.
