STAND Above the Influence Youth_Coalition started the New Year by participating in the grand opening celebration of the All Ways Center alongside the community. STAND members took part in the Prevention Advocacy Day T-shirt contest organized by the Community Coalition Alliance, where a STAND Youth Member, Keyara, won second place for her design.

In February, STAND had a presence at the Florida Department of Health in Pasco County event and the Premier Community Health & Fun Fest, where they distributed educational resources for youth and families. Additionally, in February, STAND reached a significant milestone of 502 followers on their social media page and are grateful for the community's support. The previously scheduled Prevention Advocacy Trip was postponed to March due to inclement weather in Tallahassee. In March, STAND was invited to participate in the SADD Health & Safety Fair at Wiregrass Ranch High School, where STAND representatives provided educational materials and STAND swag to the high school youth. Currently, the STAND youth members are busy planning the upcoming STAND Youth Summit, titled "Press Play on Mental Health -Find Your Rhythm So You Can Help Others." For more details, please refer to the accompanying flyer. A group of STAND Youth members and Advisors are also eagerly anticipating the rescheduled Prevention Advocacy Trip. We extend our heartfelt thanks to AHC, Baycare, the Rotary Club of New Port Richey, and United Way of Pasco for sponsoring this trip.

The excitement for the upcoming months continues to build as STAND prepares for a series of engaging activities and community events. The STAND Coordinator and Advisors are incredibly proud of the dedication of the STAND youth members, whose efforts make all these initiatives possible. With each event and milestone, STAND continues to inspire and empower young people to be leaders and advocates for a healthier community. The SAFE (Suicide Awareness Finds Empowerment) Suicide Prevention Coalition was established in 2021 as a workgroup under the Pasco Acute Care Committee. Since its inception, SAFE has brought together a diverse group of partners committed to raising awareness and preventing suicide in the community. Partner organizations include the Alliance for Healthy Communities, James A. Haley Veterans' Hospital, BayCare, Bobby White Foundation, Pasco Sheriff's Office, Advent Health, Area Agency on Aging of Pasco-Pinellas, NAMI Pasco County Florida, Florida Department of Children and Families, Florida Health Pasco County, Pasco County Schools, American Foundation for Suicide Prevention, TGH Behavioral Health Hospital, and Central Florida Behavioral Health Network.

Since the fall of 2022, the Alliance for Healthy Communities has supported SAFE by hosting its website and recently integrating the initiative into its regular meetings and communications. SAFE's work goes beyond just meetings, with participation in major community events such as the NOPE Candlelight Vigils, Pedals for Prevention, Opioid Town Halls, Pasco Mental Health Summits, Veterans' Coffee Socials, and the ASAP Conference in 2024.

Past initiatives have included surveying providers to assess the effectiveness of current assessment and screening tools. SAFE also collaborated with STAND to host a youth-focused activity during Suicide Awareness Month in September 2023.

Currently, SAFE is expanding its initiatives, including growing the Veterans' Coffee Socials, launching the Gun Shop Project, and focusing on outreach to individuals aged 60+. These ongoing projects aim to further the coalition's mission of empowering individuals and communities with the tools to intervene and support those at risk of suicide.



Vaping continues to be a growing concern in Pasco County Schools, with new trends making it increasingly difficult for parents and educators to identify these devices. In recent coalition meetings, members highlighted alarming developments. including vapes disguised as everyday items like inhalers or even gaming devices. ASAP is actively collaborating with school leaders to support the development and enforcement of policies aimed at addressing this issue. Particularly troubling is the rise in reports of elementary-aged children found with vapes, often tied to a widespread misconception among parents that these products are harmless. To help raise awareness, images of newer, harder-torecognize vapes are displayed alongside this message so parents can better identify and prevent use at home.






Data That Drives Change

Pasco County Vaping


Nicotine Vaping and Marijuana Vaping

Vaping has rapidly emerged, both within Florida and across the nation, as one of the most prevalent forms of adolescent substance use. In 2020, new items that distinguish between nicotine vaping and marijuana vaping were added to the FVSAS questionnaire. The graphs below show the percentage of students reporting one or more occasions of vaping nicotine and vaping marijuana within the past 30 days. For Pasco County, the graphs show the change in vaping prevalence rates between 2020 and 2024. Statewide comparison data for Florida as a whole are shown for 2024.



Vaping Nicotine and Vaping Marijuana

This overlap reveals the role of vaping as a substance delivery system. **62%** of Pasco County students who vape nicotine also vape marijuana, and **68%** of students who vape marijuana also vape nicotine.
